NEW GOVERNMENT A WIN FOR ANIMAL WELFARE

Animal Care Australia celebrates incoming Labor Animal Welfare Plan

Sydney, NEW SOUTH WALES, (23 May 2022) Australia's peak animal welfare body, Animal Care Australia, is relieved to see Animal Welfare back on the federal political agenda.

Labor has promised to establish an independent Inspector-General of Animal Welfare (IGAW) and Live Animal Exports, along with \$1 Million a year to establish the IGAW as a statutory position operating independently within the federal Department of Agriculture.

"Accountability and transparency is something that Animal Care Australia has been arguing for since our inception in 2018" said Michael Donnelly, Animal Care Australia President. "Animal Welfare needs to be protected from, and held independently outside of political agendas, especially extreme animal rights ideologies."

Over the past decade, the lack of good animal welfare policies by the major parties has seen the rise of extreme animal rights groups filling the vacuum. This has been to the detriment of Australian companion and domestic animals, by gradually replacing both good and bad welfare policies with animal rights bans and restrictions. Labor's IGAW is an opportunity to establish National standards and accountability on important Animal Welfare issues.

This is not just about Live Animal Exports - companion animals and other animals in captivity have been negatively impacted by recent changes to state legislation across the country. Animal Welfare will now have Federal oversight, which should offer improvements and protections to welfare standards.

“It’s time the government took control of the compliance of animal welfare legislation instead of outsourcing it to charitable organisations.” Mr Donnelly said. “If not, those responsible for Animal Welfare compliance need to be held liable for their actions.”

Animal Care Australia regularly consults with state departments regarding Animal Welfare, providing a clear and informed perspective in the revision of animal welfare policies. Just this year, ACA appeared as a witness in Parliamentary Inquiries investigating Puppy Farming in NSW, reviewing the NSW Animal Welfare Act 2021, and the Effectiveness of the Approved Charitable Organisations under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act. ACA’s input has been positively received.

Animal Care Australia congratulates the Albanese Labor government and looks forward to meeting with the relevant Minister as we work together to tackle the animal welfare challenges we have been trying to address for so long.
